- Height: 10m

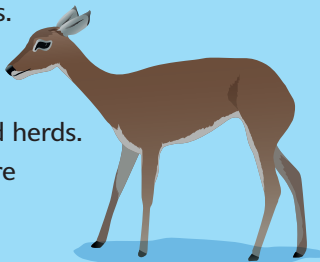


Hazel tree facts

- Height: 35m



Scots pine facts

- This helps get to the seeds in the scots pine's cones.



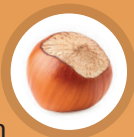

- Pine cones grow on a Scots pine tree.

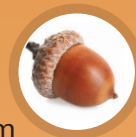
Goldcrest facts

- Young beech trees can be made in to hedges.

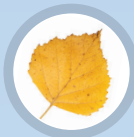
Field mouse facts
